COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS REPORT HUGH NEWELL

The Council of Governors was established by the membership of NESA at the Annual General Meeting on May 15, 2014. The purpose of the Council is to act as sole trustee, manager and custodian for the Sustainability Fund. The Fund was established by a generous donation from the estate of Therese Landry and grows through investment returns and donations from members. Therese wanted to ensure that no one was excluded from activities at NESA for economic reasons. Donations to this Fund are invested and the income earned by the investments is then used to fund programs at NESA. To date almost \$45,000 has been paid to NESA to fund programs like the Landry Leisure Pass, as well as start up funds for an emergency food bank and the Connections program.

At the request of the Board of Directors, the Council of Governors also manages and invests the Building Fund. NESA's Board of Directors is the sole authority for the use of this fund. The fund was created many years ago and has been strategic through two expansions to the building. The building fund has also enabled installing new windows in some upstairs classrooms as well as equipping rooms with sinks and cupboards after the roof collapse. Most recently the Building Fund covered the cost of painting, new flooring and the water bottle filling station after the recent infrastructure upgrades. The funds from the Building Fund have improved conditions in the building however, the building and the improvements are the property of the City of Edmonton.

Both the Sustainability Fund and the Building Fund are "Protected Funds" and subject to CRA regulations. Donations which you make to NESA can only be spent for the purposes which you identify when you make your donation. It is unlikely that we will be able to have another building expansion. Growth of the Sustainability Fund will help ensure the long-term sustainability of NESA and provide the opportunity to initiate new programs with revenue generated.

PROGRAMS

A Year of Growth, Resilience, and Community

The North Edmonton Seniors Association (NESA) had an eventful 2024, marked by adaptability, community spirit, and an exciting return home. Despite a temporary relocation due to renovations, our members remained dedicated and engaged, embracing challenges and proving that fun, learning, and connection have no boundaries.

In 2024, NESA offered 612 programs and clubs, welcoming 8,962 enrollments throughout the year. While our facility was under renovation, we operated out of multiple community venues, ensuring our members could continue participating in their favorite activities.

The dedication of our members was inspiring—despite parking challenges, temperature fluctuations, and noise in shared spaces, they showed up, helped set up, and stayed engaged. Many took advantage of the concession service at Kilkenny Community League, turning class time into a social experience.

After a limited summer session back at Northgate, we were thrilled to fully return home in the fall, offering 230 programs and clubs—our largest seasonal selection of the year!

REMEMBRANCE DAY CEREMONY



BOOK SALES

During the renovations at NESA, we faced the challenge of keeping our fundraising efforts alive. Linda, our dedicated book room coordinator, and her group of loyal volunteers came up with the idea to hold Lil' Book Sales at McClure Church. Every Monday, they set up flats full of books in the book room and in the hallways. The sales quickly became a favourite for both NESA members and friends from the community. Each Monday, McClure was busy with bookworms browsing the fresh selection of books. The space was smaller than what we were used to, but the energy was always big, thanks to the hardworking volunteers and the continual influx of donated books. We also held a two-day Arts, Crafts & Book sale in the spring which was a huge success!

Many of the book room volunteers were regulars at NESA, so hosting the Lil' Book Sales at McClure was the perfect way to continue socializing, volunteering, and fundraising for NESA. It became a wonderful social event, with volunteers reconnecting and chatting with customers. One particularly devoted customer came to every sale, both to purchase new books and puzzles, and to chat with the volunteers. Linda particularly enjoyed seeing younger faces amongst the crowds of shoppers, chatting with them and helping them find books to enjoy. From Linda and all of the book sale volunteers: "Thank you to everyone who came to support us, we really appreciate it."

Since returning to NESA in July 2024, our volunteers have seamlessly transitioned back into their familiar routine. A special highlight was our book sale in the auditorium in August, which was a huge hit. It feels great to be back in the larger space, and we're excited for the future!

CLUBS

During NESA's relocation in 2023/2024, we were able to provide alternative meeting spaces for most of our displaced clubs. Venues included the Steele Heights and Kilkenny Community Halls, and McClure United Church. Despite the change in environment, the sense of community and enjoyment remained strong. Whether through music, art, crafts, and artisan talents, or for monthly club meetings for gardening, travel, or book discussions, we were grateful for the continued support from all who adapted to the new locations and schedules. Thank you for helping keep our clubs alive during this transition.

CLUB ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS

The Garden Club held a Garden and Plant sale mid-May of 2024 and sold an impressive \$1500 worth of plants. The Cribbage Club hosted a tournament at Steele Heights and filled the seats with fellow crib enthusiasts! The Wizards of Odds 'n Ends, NESA's talented artisans who make a wide selection of knitted, crocheted, and hand-sewn items, hosted a very successful sale at Rundle Park in the late Fall of 2023 and raised over \$1000 for the NESA community. A big thank you to all of the members who were involved in this fundraiser!

At NESA, our vibrant community is successful thanks to the dedication and commitment of over 200 volunteers who are vital to our operations.

Our volunteers actively participate in a diverse range of activities, from managing our clubs, programming and fundraising initiatives to assisting with special events. We also have volunteers who contribute to board governance and committees, while others knit warm items for Edmontonians in need. They play a crucial role in fundraising events like book, puzzle and jewelry sales, bottle drives, bingos, casinos, Nevada ticket sales, and Taste of Edmonton. Our Wizards of Odd n' Edds Club consists of volunteers who create beautiful handmade items for sale using donated materials, with 100% of the proceeds returned to NESA. Whether providing administrative support at the front desk, assisting members in the Fitness Centre, offering free income tax services, or helping with programs like Connections, our volunteers are the backbone of NESA, exemplifying the spirit of community and fun!

STATISTICS

The hours logged in 2024 were quite similar to those in 2023, as we were away from the Centre for half of both years. We expect that volunteer numbers in 2025 will be comparable to the 36,000+ volunteer hours recorded in 2022.


