
Fundraising

It has been quite busy in the NESA Fundraising world!

We started the year with a Bang! Our 50/50 Draw kicked off 2022, and kept getting better. We participated in Bingos and had our Casino in November for which we received more than \$70,000.

NESA's fundraising dollars, unless allocated to a special project or fund, help offset operating costs and keep membership fees low.

Council of Governors

The Council of Governors was established by the membership of NESA at the Annual General Meeting on May 15, 2014. The purpose of the Council is to act as sole trustee, manager and custodian for the Sustainability Fund, which was established by a generous donation from the estate of Therese Landry. Revenue generated by this fund is used to fund the Landry Leisure Pass, enabling seniors to participate in NESA programs of which they may not have otherwise been able to afford. Last year over \$7,000 was paid directly to support this program. Funds donated to this program are protected and invested and only the revenue generated is used to support NESA programs. The CRA regulations sets guidelines which determine what can be done with protected funds.

The Council also manages and invests the Building Fund on behalf of the Board. There are plans to use some of these funds this year to make improvements to the building for the benefit of members. In the past two years donations to these funds have been considerably reduced. This is a situation which we hope can be resolved as we return to more normal times so that the funds can continue to grow and be utilized to meet the growing needs of NESA members.

DINNER THEATRE: A Murder Mystery: The Night Chicago Died



381 Christmas Hampers were delivered to the community – the highest recorded number of hampers yet! Isolated seniors were provided with a wish list, asking them to identify their needs and something special for Christmas

Emergency Food Pantry

Over 100 emergency food hampers were delivered to provide seniors in crisis with food security through the Emergency Food Pantry (accessed directly through NESA's Outreach Program)

Health & Wellness Fair


Aging in Place


